Key Vocabulary:

Compass: an instrument used to show the direction of north, east, south and west.



Tour: A trip with visits to various places of interest for pleasure



Harbour: A deep body of water that protects boats near land. High waves and strong currents usually do not reach harbours



Bay: water that is partly surrounded by land.



Coast: The area where the sea and land meet is called a **coast**.

Headland: A point of land usually high and often with a sheer drop, that extends into water.



Tourist Attractions: A place of interest where tourists visit.




Recap of last lesson:

Physical features are natural. These are anything that are on Earth naturally such as cliffs, sea, pebbles, shells, seaweed and sand.




Human features are manmade. This means they are built and made by humans. These can include things like a lighthouse and a pier.




St. Ives is a popular seaside town that you will learn about today. You will be making a guided tour of St Ives.

South West



About St. Ives

St. Ives is known as the 'jewel' in Cornwall's crown. It is a popular resort for visitors, especially families. St. Ives has many **attractions** and things to do for all different kinds of tourists.


In the past, St. Ives was a busy fishing village. Although much of the fishing has reduced, the **harbour** is still in use for boat trips, tourist fishing and seal spotting tours to other locations on the **coast**.

The town has **four beaches**. The golden sands and great conditions for watersports are enjoyed by everyone.



Places to Stay and Eat

There are many places to stay in St. Ives, ranging from large hotels to small guest houses and holiday cottages. St. Ives offers a wide range of places to eat, including cafes, restaurants, fine dining and the traditional fish and chips and ice cream. Don't forget to watch out for the seagulls!



Things to do

The famous artist **Barbara Hepworth** lived in St. Ives and there is a **museum** in the centre of the town which attracts many tourists to see her works.



Leach Pottery was started in St. Ives in 1920 by **Bernard Leach** which is also another popular attraction for tourists to visit.



Tate St. Ives offers many changing exhibitions and there are many smaller art galleries scattered all around the town itself.






Core and Extension Activity 1
