

What is a map?




A map is a drawing of all or part of Earth's surface. Its basic purpose is to show where things are. Maps are views from above or a 'bird's eye view' of a place and use symbols.

Maps may show visible features, such as rivers and lakes, forests, buildings, and roads.

These are the 8 points on the compass which help us to read the map.


What is route planning?

Route planning takes us one place to another by deciding which direction to go.

What kind of map was it? One on their phones (digital), a paper map, a satnav in the car?




What is the route to Wembley High Road?

I started at Wembley Primary School.








TASK


- **Skills:** Using the Wembley map can you find the route from your house to Wembley Primary School.
