

Key Facts

- Very old houses were made of stone. The roves (roof) were made of straw. The windows were made of paper or fabric.
- The inside of houses has no carpets. People used straw and plants as carpets and they slept on straw beds.
- People did not have toilets, so people would go anywhere. They called the toilet a 'privy'.
- In Tudor times, people did not work. Only Noblemen and Noblewomen worked and could afford food and clothing'
- Edwardian houses are long and have lots of space. They are made of brick.
- Edwardian houses have decorations and paintings. They also have floors, furniture and electric lighting. Some houses have fireplaces too.




