Key Facts

People who keep us safe: Parents, carers, teachers, police, family, friends, lifeguards, paramedics, firefighters.

Staying safe: Listen, follow rules, look out for signs, avoid rushing.

Home dangers: Sharp objects, electricity, stairs, windows, blind cords.

Using items safely: Some things are dangerous if misused.

Emergency help: Call **999** for paramedics, police, or fire services.

Stealing vs. borrowing: Stealing is taking without permission and is illegal. Borrowing requires permission and intention to return.

Peer pressure: Others may influence us to make bad choices.

Children's rights: Kids can be hurt in different ways, but it's never their fault. Safe adults or Childline (0800 1111) can help.

Road safety: Use zebra and pelican crossings properly.

Caring for the planet: Reduce, reuse, recycle.


