- Amy Johnson was a famous pilot.
- She was the first female pilot to fly solo to Australia
- There were not many female pilots at that time.
- She inspired women to have a say and do jobs that were traditionally done by men.
- Flying solo to Australia was not easy, especially as a woman.
- What Amy had achieved was significant in history.
- Amy continued to challenge herself and never gave up.
- No one really know what happened to Amy and how she died.
